

The Institution's Certification and Agreement directs each institution applying for HEERF funds to comply with Section 18004(e) of the CARES Act and submit an initial report (the "30-day Fund Report") to the Secretary of Education thirty (30) days from the date the Institution signed the Certification and Agreement, and every 45 days thereafter. In accordance with ED's guidance, the following information has been uploaded to Louisiana College's (LC) website.



#### Reporting Requirements:

1. The opening paragraph of LC's "CARES Act Reporting" page provides LC's acknowledgement that the institution signed and returned to ED the Certification and Agreement and the assurance that the institution has used, or intends to use, no less than 50 percent of the funds received under Section 18004(a)(1) of the CARES Act to provide Emergency Financial Aid Grants to students.
2. As indicated on the signed Certification and Agreement link provided in the opening paragraph of LC's "CARES Act Reporting" page, LC received \$573,753 to be utilized for Emergency Financial Aid Grants to students.
3. As of the 30-Day Fund Report, LC has distributed \$307,925 in Emergency Financial Aid Grants to eligible students.
4. As of the 30-Day Fund Report, LC estimates a total of 955 students are eligible to participate in programs under Section 484 in Title IV of the Higher Education Act of 1965 and thus eligible to receive Emergency Financial Aid Grants to students under Section 18004(a)(1) of the CARES Act.
5. As of the 30-Day Fund Report, 307 students have received an Emergency Financial Aid Grant to students under Section 18004(a)(1) of the CARES Act.
6. In accordance with ED's guidance, eligible LC students who were enrolled 2019-2020 Spring will be issued a grant for the cost and disruption of their in-seat course(s) transitioning to an online platform. The Department of Education indicates students who filed or who are eligible to file a FAFSA may receive emergency financial aid grants, if they were otherwise eligible for Title IV funding. However, students who were enrolled exclusively in online courses for 2019-2020 Spring are not eligible for emergency financial aid grants.

All Title IV eligible students (Graduate & Undergraduate) enrolled at least half-time who submitted an application for the CARES Act Student Emergency Grant by the published deadline of May 11, 2020 were awarded as follows:

- All students received a base award of \$400 for full-time students, \$300 for  $\frac{3}{4}$  time students, and \$200 for  $\frac{1}{2}$  time students
- Pell eligible students (\$3000+) will receive an additional \$400 for full-time; \$300 for  $\frac{3}{4}$  time; \$200 for  $\frac{1}{2}$  time
- Pell eligible students (\$2400-\$2999) will receive an additional \$300 for full-time; \$225 for  $\frac{3}{4}$  time; \$150 for  $\frac{1}{2}$  time
- Pell students (\$1-\$2399) will receive an additional \$200 for full-time; \$150 for  $\frac{3}{4}$  time; \$100 for  $\frac{1}{2}$  time

- Students with an EFC between \$1 - \$10,000 who did not receive Pell will receive an additional \$100 for full-time; \$75 for  $\frac{3}{4}$  time; \$50 for  $\frac{1}{2}$  time.
- The first round of grants awarded to students applying by the May 11 deadline also received an additional stipend matching the amount of their base award.
- Student grants were issued to students via direct deposit into the bank account provided by the student or else a paper check was mailed to the student's permanent address on record.
